# Do I qualify?

If your income is below the monthly limit, and you have \$2,250 or less in assets, you may be eligible. Check your eligibility by calling 2-1-1 or online at <a href="http://www.in.gov/fssa/dfr/2999.htm">http://www.in.gov/fssa/dfr/2999.htm</a>.

### How do I apply?

## What information will I need for my interview?

You will be asked to provide information about your eligibility during the interview, which will likely be by phone. You must provide documentation to verify your eligibility within 13 days of your interview. You will need to provide ID, Social Security Numbers for everyone for whom you are applying, proof of your expenses like rent and utilities, and proof of income, such as pay stubs, unemployment benefits, and child support. You can mail copies of the information or fax it to FSSA. Once your application is completed, you should know in 30 days or less whether you are eligible, what your benefits will be, and if you are not eligible the reason why.

# Is it worth it to apply?

The minimum benefit for an eligible individual is \$194 a year. SNAP benefits could help you and your family stretch food dollars and help your local economy. *Why wait? Apply today!*
